

## **DUBAI DUTY FREE SHERGAR CUP DASH**





MANACCAN is interesting as the youngest in the field, especially as he could have run against fellow three-year-olds in the meeting finale. The latter is a 6f event, over which distance he's gained his only win to date (in a two-year-old Newmarket novice race), although his quality form is over this minimum trip of 5f. Fourth in last autumn's Cornwallis and fifth of 27 in the Palace Of Holyrood House at the royal meeting here two months ago, he was perhaps a shade unlucky not to score off this mark (101) at Chester last time and has the class potential in this race.

## **DUBAI DUTY FREE SHERGAR CUP CHALLENGE**





**SOUTHERN VOYAGE** Comes with risks attached but still appeals at a double-figure price for the Dubai Duty Free Shergar Cup Challenge. Archie Watson's four-year-old has a taking profile if you ignore his final run of last season (soft ground) and reappearance effort a month ago. Starting a well-backed 5-2 favourite last time, he sweated up badly and perhaps lost his race in the preliminaries. On the assumption that run was too bad to be true, he may be worth another chance back at the course where he won on handicap debut last summer.

## **DUBAI DUTY FREE SHERGAR CUP MILE**





MONTASSIB has looked in need of a longer trip on his last two starts in high-end seven-furlong handicaps and gets a good opportunity to test his stamina credentials in the Shergar Cup Mile. William Haggas's lightly raced four-year-old has been beaten less than two lengths in both the Buckingham Palace at Royal Ascot and Newmarket's Bunbury Cup, keeping on well at the end.

## **DUBAI DUTY FREE SHERGAR CUP CLASSIC**

SELECTION SHEER ROCKS



SHEER ROCKS, unbeaten in two minor events as a juvenile, has continued a theme of gradual progression since a lacklustre effort on his reappearance. Eve Johnson Houghton's colt shaped well enough after a break dropped back to a mile at Sandown and Bath, before regaining the winning thread over an extended 1m2f at Chester. He then ran encouragingly upped to 1m3f at Goodwood last week, with his staying-on fourth worthy of an upgrade considering he was always playing catch-up after suffering interference leaving the stalls. Provided he gets away on reasonably level terms from stall 1 here, he should go well at a price.

## TARGET TRAINERS



Over the last nine years, two runnings of the Dubai Duty Free Shergar Cup Dash (Race 3) have gone the way of Robert Cowell. In 2017, Cowell also hit the board with a second. Of the 10 declared runners, the trainer is represented by **ARECIBO**, **BLUE DE VEGA** and **DUBAI STATION**. Beware however, Cowell hasn't had a winner in 20 days.

Marcus Tregoning has won two runnings of the Dubai Duty Free Shergar Cup Mile (Race 6) over the last nine years, including with **POWER OF DARKNESS** in 2019. The former is the first reserve this year.

The Dubai Duty Free Shergar Cup Classic (Race 7) has gone the way of the Johnston team three times over the last nine years. Both APPROACHABILITY and SHARP COMBO do the honours for the yard this year.



## **GUIDE TO ASCOT**

Because the run-in on Ascot's round course is relatively short, positioning - jockeyship in other words - is key. It goes without saying that in steadily-run races you want to be towards the sharp end but, whatever the pace, you can get into trouble trying to come through rivals late on. We're still learning about the straight course, following the relaying a few years back, but in my view it's more pace-dependent than drawdependent. Given the right pace to chase, I reckon you can win from anywhere.



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The round course is a right-handed, triangular circuit of fourteen furlongs, with a run-in of  $2^{1}/_{2}$  furlongs. There is a straight mile course and the Old mile course which joins the round course in Swinley Bottom. Despite the downhill run into Swinley Bottom and relatively short run-in from the final turn, Ascot is galloping in character. Since the redevelopment, the turn into the straight has become more sweeping and those ridden prominently can be difficult to peg back. Nowadays, the ground in the straight drains quicker than the rest of the course, meaning going descriptions can vary.
